Novenas

A novena is “nine successive days of prayer, private or public, to obtain special favors or graces. It differs from an octave, or the 8 days of prayerful celebration that follow certain feasts, because the octave has a place in the liturgy that the novena (which generally precedes a feast with which it may be associated) has not... the novena tends to be marked by a feeling of urgent need and yearning. The novena can be considered a triple triduum (a period of three days), involving a more prolonged concentration of devotion and spiritual effort.

“The nine days that the Apostles spent in Jerusalem at the command of the Lord as they awaited the coming of the Holy Spirit (Lk 24.49; Acts 1.4) has been suggested as a scriptural prototype of the novena, but this devotion was first introduced not as an exercise preparatory to an event of great spiritual significance but as the observance of a period of mourning. The Greeks and Romans, as well as other peoples of antiquity, were accustomed to observe 9 days of mourning (novendialia), with a special feast on the 9th day, after a death or burial. This practice was adopted by Christians, but with Christian rather than pagan forms of observance... a vestige of the earlier practice remains in the novendialia, or Pope’s Novena, still observed after the death of a supreme pontiff.” (The Catholic Encyclopedia)

In honor of our Lord’s nine months spent in His Mother’s womb, a special preparation of nine days for the feast of Christmas was observed in France and Spain beginning in the early Middle Ages. The **O Antiphons** for Vespers (the Church’s official evening prayer) which begin on every year December 17th are a continuation of this ancient practice. As we celebrate *Trinity Sunday* today, we are reminded that “three” is the mystical number of perfection; and so, three times three, nine, is a “trinity of trinities.” Three days of special prayer essentially honoring each of the Divine Persons.

Our practice/experience of novenas today is varied. We have traditional novenas directly connected to feasts: such as the Novena to the Holy Spirit, which was recently prayed publicly in our parish in the days leading up to Pentecost. Other novenas to those saints regarded as “powerful intercessors”—St. Anthony of Padua, St. Philip Neri, St. Francis Xavier...; and of course, to our Blessed Mother under various titles; and Our Blessed Lord, the Holy Infant of Prague—are still prayed in preparation for the particular feast day celebrations; some may be prayed any time of the year. Several have become *Perpetual Novenas*, like the Miraculous Medal Novena and the St. Jude Novena, which we pray here in church every Monday and Thursday, respectively. These have become part of local and universal Catholic devotional life. Holy Mother Church recommends novenas as serviceable to true devotion and piety.

We might come across novenas that are in essence like chain-letters or the e-mails we receive which say things such as: “If you want your request granted, you must leave nine copies of this in church for nine days,” and “You must send this to seven people in the next 24 hours,” and “It is never known to fail.” Any such commands **are not Catholic**. These are abuses, because they suppose that we can manipulate God / the saints, or that we are performing some sort of magical prescription or formula that will produce the desired outcome by attempting to “control” God / the saints. This is not good faith, but a deformed faith deteriorating into superstition; a sin against the First Commandment.

In fine, true Catholic piety is manifested through a novena that is offered in supplication (or sometimes in thanksgiving) to God (often through the intercession of a saint) for a particular intention or a favor that is being requested. Like all prayer, it should always be prayed with faith and trust that God knows all our needs and the desires of our hearts. The earnestness of repetition on nine successive days with perseverance and constancy is most important, making our time of prayer and devotion always with the spirit of our Divine Savior, that whatever our request: “...not my will, but thine be done.” (Lk 22:42).

Speaking of prayer, I must say that the William Floyd Board of Education has been rather “brave” to invite me and my predecessors, Frs. Atkins and Mirro, to offer “words” at the W.F. High School graduation in the past. As I have been informed, Federal Law, upheld by the US Supreme Court, is **very strict** on making sure that any sort of prayer is kept out of our public schools. I was again graciously invited by the Board to attend this year, but not to say anything, since the rather general prayer that I offered last year (or was it perhaps my very presence?) offended a handful of people, who subsequently registered complaints. Whatever the exact specifics of those complaints were, I do not know, nor do I care to. It is very apparent that any prayer at a “non-voluntary audience” graduation ceremony clearly violates the law. I just thought I would inform parishioners who attend the graduation why I might not be there...

Most Holy Trinity

Sometimes I turn into an 8-year-old girl.

At times the transformation is predictable: at the sight of presents under the Christmas tree or the delightful sounds of exploding fireworks on the Fourth of July. But at other times the transformation is unexpected: at the sight of a turtle meandering along the bike trail or the taste of the first fresh peach of summer.

Though I'm a grown woman, these experiences (and many others) seem to instantly transform me into an awe-filled child complete with squeals, wide eyes, and sometimes hushed silence.

The solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity calls for a similar response. Though theologians have written libraries of descriptions, explanations, and images of our trinitarian God, we ultimately have to confess that the Trinity is a mystery before which we bow in awe, as did Moses on encountering Yahweh on Mount Sinai.

Our God is described in today's Exodus reading as "merciful and gracious" and "slow to anger and

rich in kindness and fidelity." The Hebrew word for merciful (rahum) describes a love for the child of one's womb.

Given such tender parental mercy and love from our God while still in sin and brokenness, we can respond

only with humility and awe.

So on this day perhaps we ought to practice some childlike awe. Go outside and ponder God's wondrous creation. Inspect the details of a leaf, an insect, a water droplet on a blade of grass. Delight in the soft skin of a newborn child. Breathe in deeply the aroma of a home-cooked meal. Study the

glow of a candle flame. Encounter the face of God in your neighbor, your spouse, your child.

Sit in awed silence before our merciful and loving God, the Three in One to whom we belong.
