

## reed and General Intercessions

At the end of the Homily (on Sundays and Solemnities), the Symbol or Profession of Faith or Creed, when prescribed, is either sung or said. The translation of the *Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed* that will follow differs from

the translation we are currently reciting. It is faithful to the Latin (the original versions of the 4th Century were Greek), and therefore, contains a few noticeable differences.

To begin with, the profession of faith starts not with the "**We** believe" with which we are familiar, but with "**I** believe" = "Credo" in Latin. (A creed acts as a yardstick of correct or orthodox belief. It distinguishes a set of believers from deniers of a particular doctrine or system of faith. It is not the whole of the faith, but the basics.) All of these statements about the Blessed Trinity and the Catholic-Christian faith, though usually declared communally, are to be declared *personally*. Just as when U.S. citizens recite the "Pledge of Allegiance," it is "**I** pledge allegiance..." One cannot take an oath for someone else nor make a formal declaration of what someone else believes. (The use of "**We** believe" came out of the dynamic equivalence translation method of the late 1960's, which attempted to render the Latin version into more communal and person-in-the-pew-friendly, contemporary English.)

Briefly, the *Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed* was the product of the first two ecumenical councils of the Christian Church, which formally gathered all the bishops to respond to particular issues and controversies. The first was held in Nicea (present-day Isnik, Turkey) in 325 A.D., and the second was in Constantinople (present day Istanbul, Turkey) in 381. The formal statement of beliefs was a response to the Arian heresy, promoted by a bishop named Arius, who basically denied the eternal divinity of Christ. So many Christians – priests and bishops included – fell into this heresy, that Church leaders needed to address and express clearly the eternal truths of the Catholic-Christian faith to protect true believers and bring back to the fold those who had fallen away; and essentially letting people know that "one who does not believe these basic teachings is not Catholic." ("Anathema" is the term frequently used for one whose belief is outside that of the Church.)

As far as the Creed's place in the Mass, "...its liturgical use is an after-thought. It was not till comparatively late, when people were used to the declaration of faith as a protest against heretics, that it occurred to them as a suitable addition to the public Eucharistic service. It was then inserted, not always in the same place. In the West it appears at Mass first in Spain, as a protest against the Arians." (from The Mass: A Study of the Roman Liturgy, by Adrian Fortescue).

And so the Symbol or Profession of Faith or Creed we will be singing/saying:

I believe in one God, / the Father almighty, / maker of heaven and earth, / of all things visible and invisible. / I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, / the Only Begotten Son of God, / born of the Father before all ages. / God from God, Light from Light, / true God from true God, / begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; / through him all things were made. / For us men and for our salvation / he came down from heaven,

At the words that follow up to and including and became man, all bow.

and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, / and became man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, / he suffered death and was buried, / and rose again on the third day/ in accordance with the Scriptures. / He ascended into heaven / and is seated at the right hand of the Father. / He will come again in glory / to judge the living and the dead / and his kingdom will have no end. / I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, / who proceeds from the Father and the Son, / who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, / who has spoken through the prophets. / I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. / I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins / and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead / and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Two of the most significant changes are:

The word "consubstantial" (currently translated: "one in being with the Father") means that the Father and the Son are of the same essence or substance.

"By the power of the Holy Spirit was **incarnate** of the Virgin Mary" (currently translated: "was born of the Virgin Mary"), means that our Lord was "given bodily form and substance to" of the Virgin Mary. This is clearly on a deeper level than the simple "was born of."

Instead of the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed, especially during Lent and Easter Time, the baptismal Symbol of the Roman Church, known as the Apostles' Creed, may be used. Then follows the Universal Prayer, that is, the Prayer of the Faithful or Bidding Prayers.

The Universal Prayer, or Prayer of the Faithful, (of which we are familiar) is composed of petitions (and responses) which usually include prayers for the Church, for the world, for those who are in any kind of need; concerns of the local community, the sick and suffering, the dead, and those personal intentions that we bring to the Lord before entering into the Eucharistic Sacrifice.

#### IRA Charitable Rollover: Now is Your Opportunity

You can make a gift from your Individual Retirement Account to St. Jude before December 31st. You must be over 70 and use a traditional IRA. You will not have to report your gift as income-it will be income tax-free, and it will count toward your required minimum distribution (RMD). The best way for you to start is with your IRA custodian. Tell them you want to make a "qualified charitable distribution". In most cases you will only have to fill out a simple form. Your gift must go directly from your IRA to St. Jude-tax-free. If you receive the money first, then you'll be taxed on it like any other distribution.

# Which Sacraments are required for Catholics marrying in the Church?

Catholics who want to be married in the Church must be baptized in the Church, but must they also have made their first reconciliation and Communion and been confirmed? —Tracey

Dear Tracey,

The Code of Canon Law allows a baptized Catholic to be married in the Church without having celebrated the sacraments of reconciliation, confirmation, and the Eucharist, but that scenario is far from ideal.

The canon says, "If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics who have not yet received... confirmation are to receive it before...marriage."

Likewise, the canon strongly recommends "that those to be married approach the sacraments of penance and the Most Holy Eucharist so that they may fruitfully receive the sacrament of marriage" (1065).

The experience of marriage can be richer and more fruitful for Catholics who have grounded their practice of the faith through full initiation and regular celebrations of the Eucharist and reconciliation.

Catholics who want to be married in the Church but haven't received sacraments beyond baptism should talk with their pastor to see what makes the most sense regarding their deeper entrance into the sacramental life of the Church.
