ife Imitates Art

Prior to 1965, Cosmopolitan was a women's magazine much like Good Housekeeping, Ladies Home Journal, and several others of the genre. They attracted the reader who was trying to be a model wife, mother, and cook; seeking how "to do it all" while ever looking trim and fashionable. In other words how to be perfect, just like Donna Reed. Was it a dream? Yes, yet an ideal and wholesome one. Sales of the publication were comparable to the others in the field: solid, but flat.

Enter Helen Gurley Brown. (Her husband David Brown produced "Jaws" and other successful films). In 1962, at her husband's urging, she wrote the book, "Sex and the Single Girl," which generally shocked the American populace and helped to launch the sexual revolution. It sold millions of copies. When Ms. Brown was asked by the Hearst Corporation to take over the ho-hum Cosmopolitan in 1965, she immediately replaced the prim-and-proper, modestly attired cover girls with provocatively dressed, voluptuous models and soft-core porn cover lines that went even further to invite the would-be reader into its shameless, fantasy contents. Circulation tripled, and that cover format has continued to be the template these past 47 years, as any visitor to a newsstand, supermarket, or drugstore chain checkout line magazine rack can testify.

When Ms. Brown died last month at the age of 90, her legacy and contribution to the modern women's movement was recognized as a tremendous one by the mainstream mass-media outlets. She prodded women to freely express and enjoy their sexuality whether prior to, or in addition to marriage. She encouraged wives who were bored with their husbands to move on to their friends' husbands for the guilt-free enjoyment and thrills she said they deserve. Unfortunately, a portion of the public bought into these lies then, and still continue to do to an even greater level to this day. While some aspects of the modern feminist movement had laudable goals (and results), such as gaining women greater access to higher education, better employment, and general opportunity using their gifts and intelligence to be on equal footing with men, it did so at a very high cost.

While (to varying degrees) some great strides have been made in the areas enumerated immediately above, womanity and society have been struck serious blows that may eclipse any of the good accomplished. In the name of "freedom," Ms. Brown's publication encouraged women to be aggressive in their pursuit of carnal fulfillment by imagining themselves as the wild and vivacious Cosmo cover-girls, all they had to do was employ the advice of the cover-line articles described.

What is being reported in *Psychology of Women Quarterly* is that the *Cosmopolitan* attitude has led to an even deeper objectification of women <u>by women themselves</u>. When women no longer treat themselves and their bodies with the respect and dignity that is rightfully theirs by suppressing their femininity and behaving as anything-goes-sex-kittens, it is no wonder that men treat women with even less respect then they did in the mid-1960's. Is it so surprising that some men today see women only as objects for their selfish pleasure?

The reality is, when one (whether male or female) absorbs this type of make-believe material, they slowly begin to believe that these pleasure-fantasies are possible. Once the seed is planted, people find themselves becoming disappointed with their less-than dynamic spouse and lives. People actually become unhappy because they think their lives should be as enjoyable, exciting, and uninhibited as the ones they read about.

Consequently, the movement looked down upon women who chose to get married, raise their children, and be stay-at-home-moms as somehow not with the times and counter productive to feminist goals. The denigration of motherhood and femininity (and also responsible fatherhood) are highly visible in our society. Readily available contraception and abortion are absolute musts for one seeking to live the Cosmo lifestyle, as children (God' gift) do not fit in well with it. I have been told that the magazines targeting teenage girls are almost just as bad as the "adult" ones; priming them for the more developed forms of immorality.

Motherhood is one of the most important (if not the most important) job in society, please God, with the support of a committed husband and father, who cherishes, honors, and protects his wife and family. Admittedly, this traditional family and marriage are not the fantasy-world lies sold by *Cosmopolitan*, *Playboy* or any other magazine. A good marriage is not a Hollywood thrill-aminute. But it is the place where real life and true love have the greatest possibility of flourishing. A good marriage comprised of a husband and wife who are trying to be faithful, love God, each other, and their family is much better than anything the empty hedonism a self-centered society can conjure-up.

Do Muslims worship the same God we do?

A friend told me the Church teaches that Muslims worship the God of Abraham just as Christians and Jews do. I find this difficult to believe—Christians turn the other cheek, but all you hear about Islam is violence. How can we possibly worship the same God?

Dear Joan,

Paragraph 16 of the Second Vatican Council's 1964 document Dogmatic Constitution on the Church (*Lumen Gentium*) says Muslims "acknowledge the Creator" and are included in "the plan of salvation." We differ in that we believe Christ is God, whereas Muslims believe Christ was merely a prophet. (To read this document, go to vatican.va/archive/hist_councils/ii_vatican_council/. Under *Lumen Gentium* [second on the list], click on English.)

You're correct that followers of Jesus have a serious call to be peacemakers. It was because of their belief in Jesus, the ultimate man of peace, that the early Christian martyrs were able to forgive the persecutors who were about to take their lives and that Pope John Paul II was able to forgive the man who tried to assassinate him. But Islam is not a religion that advocates violence, and the vast majority of the world's 1.5 billion Muslims are not violent.

When you're reading headlines, it's important to remember that throughout history the reputations of many large groups—*including the Catholic Church*—have been seriously damaged by the actions of a small minority who do things that violate the group's beliefs.
